Hamsters make great pets. Before you bring one home, make sure you have
everything ready that it would <u>needs</u> .
A wired cage with a deep plastic base makes a good home of these furry animals. The
plastic base is easy to clean and the wire sides mean your pet gets plenty of air. Altarnetifely,
you could keep your hamster in a <u>spareshial</u> tank.
Cover the floor of the cage with a thick layer of hardwood shavings. Avoid pine
shavings and sawdust as they are very fine and can get treped in your pet's eyes.
Wild hamsters dig tunnels and live in <u>barows</u> , where they can hide and sleep. Your pet
should have lots of intrezting tunnels to explore. Your pet will also need a nest box. Hamsters
(46) (47) chewed a lot. Wooden or ceramic boxes are best, and a clay flower pot works just as well.
Add some hay or paper towels that your pet can shraed.
