Key Attraction:Orang-utans

Do you know that these creatures are facing a fuzzy future?

Forest fires and logging contribute to the destruction of the orang-utans' natural homes. Poaching further reduces their low numbers. About 55 000 Bornean orang-utans and 7 500 Sumatran orang-utans are left.

Singapore Zoo has always been a strong advocate for the survival of orang-utans. We are proud to have bred a total of 37 orang-utans to date. Some have been sent to zoos in Malaysia, Sri Lanka, India, Vietnam, Japan, Australia and New Zealand as part of a worldwide exchange programme to facilitate the breeding of these highly endangered apes.

Free-ranging Habitat for Orang-utans

- Singapore Zoo is the first zoo in the world to feature a free-ranging area for the orangutans.
- Two free-ranging areas, an island and a boardwalk complete with tall trees and thick vegetation, have been created for visitors to view these fascinating creatures.
- The absence of walls and the inclusion of the raised boardwalk allow guests to have a 360 degree view at an elevated angle.
- To simulate the natural rainforest environment, multi-tier climbing platforms have been constructed for these creatures to swing, climb and play around. These act as escape routes when fire breaks out.
- The habitat is also equipped with behavioural enrichment devices to ensure these smart apes stay intellectually and physically engaged every day.






Hang around for more

Growing up in Singapore in the 1940s, amid the deprivation of food and uncertainty brought about by the war, the idea of keeping a dog was never a consideration. So, when my daughter, then six years old, asked me if we could have a dog when we moved to New York, the answer was no. I knew that she would be tired of the animal soon and that I would be responsible for looking after 5 it. As this was not a reason which could resonate with a six year old, I had to refuse on the ground that the streets of New York were too dangerous for a child her age to walk a dog.

When we returned to Singapore, this reason was no longer credible. As such, there was a half-hearted agreement to look for a suitable Labrador retriever. 10 One day, after lunch in Upper Thomson Road, we made a detour to a pet shop nearby. There was no intention to buy anything. It was an attempt to mollify a young girl and to put off to a later date any idea of buying a dog.

Needless to say, it did not work out as I had planned. After several minutes of looking around, we came across a rascally little collie that would not stop licking and nibbling our fingers. We fell in love with him instantly. Penny, my wife, like all women, was more firm. She came up with all the practical reasons. A collie, with its long and thick mane, would be unsuitable in Singapore's hot weather. It was one against three and before we knew it, I was at the counter paying for the puppy and all the things that were apparently needed to look after it. 20

Back home, the work of raising a puppy began in earnest. First, we had to come up with a name for it and it turned out to be more difficult than I had anticipated. Common names were not acceptable to my daughter. She eventually came up with "Shakespeare", a name which would amuse strangers wherever we went. There was much to learn about raising a puppy. In the first few weeks, we tried to house-train him, that is, training our pet not to make the house dirty with its

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urine and faeces but without much success. Soon, the house became an unsightly minefield of dog poo.

Then, there were the crazy antics of this little fur ball. He would dash around blindly and without any real aim until stopped by some immovable object. 30 Once, he ran into the glass sliding door and we discovered that dogs, too, have a set of mllk teeth. Two of these fell off much to our distress and the vet had to be woken up close to midnight.

Shakespeare was one of the most gentle, friendly and attentive dogs around. When we had visitors to stay over, he would put his head on their lap and look up longingly, imploring them to play with him once he got used to them. Over the years, his gentle nature had convinced many friends to have a pet. He was attentive to people and could make them feel welcome. Family members, in particular, had been greeted with a long spell of barking each time they visited us after an absence of several years.

All these years, Shakespeare had been a constant and falthful companion to me. I hardly had any complaint about my health largely due to the long walks which we took daily without fail.


