



To keep your birds in good trim, it is important not to overfeed. Overfed birds simply become (21) sluggish. In this regard, they are just like their masters. Of the various ways of (22) striking the right quantity of food to lay out each day, the most successful is by measuring an excessive quantity of corn into a hopper and allowing the birds to eat their fill. Whatever quantity remains should be subtracted from the original feed and then a further reduction of about a quarter of the total should be made. You can, thereafter, (23) indubitably find out if your rationing is (24) inadequate by observing the droppings of each bird after it has gone to roost. When it is cold and during the breeding season, you can be a little more (25) liberal. When there are young to be fed, the general supply should be very greatly supplemented. My mother's parents came from Hungary, but my grandfather was educated in Germany. My grandfather was the only one in his family to come to the United States. He still had relatives living in Europe. Even though Hungarian was his native language, my grandfather was able to hold a conversation in nine languages, but was most comfortable in German. Every morning, he read the German language newspaper, which was American owned. In the early days of the war, my grandmother implored him to stop taking the German newspaper and to take an English language paper, instead. He scoffed at the idea, explaining that the fact that it was in German did not make it a German newspaper, but only an American newspaper, printed in German. Nevertheless, my grandmother insisted he heed her advice. Finally, under duress, he gave up the German newspaper.

When World War 1 broke out, my grandfather lamented the fact that if my uncle, his only son, had to go, it would be cousin fighting against cousin. One day, the inevitable happened and Uncle Milton received his draft notice. My grandparents were very upset, but my mother his little sister, was ecstatic. Now, she could brag about her soldier brother going off to war. She was ten years old and my uncle, realizing how he was regarded by his little sister and all of her friends, went out and bought them all service pins, which meant that they had a loved one in the service. All the little girls were delighted. When the day came for him to leave, his whole regiment left together from the same train station. There was a band playing and my mother and her friends came to see him off. Each one wore her service pin and waved a small American flag, cheering the boys.

The moment came and the recruits boarded the train. The band played and the crowd cheered. Although no one noticed, my grandmother had a tear in her eye for the only son going off to war. The train groaned as if it knew the destiny to which it was taking its passengers: It soon began to move with the people still cheering and waving their flags, the band still playing. The train slowly departed from the station. It had gone about a thousand yards when it suddenly ground to a halt. The band stopped playing, the crowd stopped cheering. Everyone gazed in wonder as the train slowly backed up and returned to the station. It seemed an eternity until the doors opened and the men started to file out. Someone shouled, "It's the armistice. The war is over." For a moment, nobody moved, then the people heard someone bark orders at the soldiers. My mother said it was a great day, but she was just a little disappointed that it did not last a tiny bit longer.
