Thomas Alva Edison was born on 11 February 1847 in Milan, Ohio.

In his 84 years, Thomas Edison <u>acquired</u> a record number of 1,093 (16) licenses to <u>exclusively</u> make and sell his inventions. He was the driving (17) force behind innovations such as the phonograph, the light bulb and one of the earliest motion picture cameras. Known as the "Wizard of Menlo Park", he did some of his most <u>renowned</u> work in the New Jersey town.

In addition to his flair for invention, Edison was also a successful (19) businessman who was proficient at marketing his innovations to the (20) public. To date, he is one of the most influential people in the world, making his mark on scientific history.

"This cute butterfly-shaped kite will be perfect for your sister, Amir," the kite seller suggested, pushing the kite into Amir's hands. Amir frowned, annoyed with his insistence. As soon as we got my kite, we rushed home and got up to the rooftop. Drums were booming all around us, signalling the start of the event. 




