

I was sure a few people shook their heads in disbellef when they heard that I was going on stage to receive an award. Maybe they thought I did not deserve the endless praises after seeing my drawings hung all over the school. However, there I was, sitting backstage; waiting to collect an honourable award.

Since I was three, I had been taking part in art competitions and consistently emerged a winner. However, recently, I would feel extremely upset when this was no longer true. It hurt to know that I might not be as good as I thought. I wanted to quit before I started to hate drawing. Therefore, I was hesitant to enter any competition but Mrs Tan, my teacher, encouraged me to give it another try before I graduated from primary school. She said I was talented. She did not want me to lose an opportunity just because of some setbacks. With rejuctance, I submitted my name to her. Unfortunately, two weeks before the deadline, I stared at the blank paper for hours.

Then, I recalled all the things I had unleashed on myself whenever I lost an art competition. "Well, what did you expect? You are not talented!" my inner thoughts seemed to smirk, "Do you seriously think you have what it takes to be an artist?" My rebellion towards these unsympathetic thoughts poured out onto that drawing. Satisfaction overwhelmed me when I finished. However, the whole process had been tiring as I fought every snide remark which kept forming in my mind. I almost did not want to submit my drawing to Mrs Tan but since she believed in me. I thought I owed it to her."

Mrs Tan told me it was one of the best drawings I had ever done. She was confident that the judges would love it. I brushed her praises off. I thought she was just trying to comfort me. Just as Mrs Tan had predicted, I did win the top award. Initially, it felt like a great load had been lifted off my chest. It meant that my talent was recognised! Yet, almost as soon as the happiness rushed over me, self-doubt swept me into a sea of troubled thoughts:

I had not thought that this drawing had been outstanding. I had been rejected numerous times for entries I was proud of. I had stashed these pieces away in the storeroom in dismay. Hence, what made this **particular** piece stand out? I did not believe in myself and attributed it to my sheer luck this time round.

A backstage crew member tapped my shoulder and this brought me back to the present. He whispered, "You're next! Get ready to receive your award soon!"

I walked over to a mirror to neaten up and saw my reflection. "So, you finally did well," my reflection seemed to say to me, without a hint of emotion.

"Yes!" I replied defiantly to myself, "I worked really hard on the drawing and it was a challenge. The judges felt I was good and I finally won so why am I still so angry with myself? This is not fair!" Hot tears streamed down my cheeks. Slowly, I calmed down and gathered my emotions. It all became clear to me that every time I failed, I wanted to give up. I detested this. Perhaps I had thought that if I were hard on myself, I would somehow get back on my feet to prove myself wrong.

That day, I realised that I was my worst critic. It dawned on me that I should not give up each time I failed. I had constantly doubted myself and this stopped me from even trying. I winked at my reflection and got ready to go on stage. Perfection needs practice and each setback takes one a step closer. I would never again think that the number of awards I attained defined my true talent.

Each time when her art piece was rejected and she did not win in the art
competition, she was one step closer to success as she never gave up and
finally won the honourable award.
