



We told them it was the "last swim" and then it was home for dinner. Within minutes, they had drifted towards the south end of the beach but still in the shallows. Neither of us was a proficient swimmer so we were always vigilant. Soon they were a fair way from the flags and all of a sudden, they seemed out of their depth.

"I'll call them in," I said, getting up and wandering down the water edge.

By the time I had reached the shallows, they were even further out. My voice was lost over the crash of the surf. My son came in on his belly on the next wave but my daughter did not appear to be coming in. In fact, she was not coming in at all. On the contrary, she was moving away at a frightening speed. Suddenly, I read her expression — she was caught in a rip tide. Panic rising, I plunged into the water, battling against each wave that kept forcing me against the rocks at the end of the beach. I could not bear to take my eyes off her. Each time a wave broke, she was further out. Realisation struck. I was powerless to help her. I screamed at my husband, my cries obliterated by the crash of the surf. His face reflected all of my emotions: horror, disbelief, terror, trepidation...

My husband and I waved frantically towards the surf patrol, screaming our voices hoarse, "Please help us! Help!"

When I turned back towards the sea, my daughter was gone. I was paralysed by fear and **indecision**. Waiting for help only made my head spin. Just as I was about to attempt to go in again, I caught a flash of red and gold to my right. A man was running along the rocks with a flotation belt. He dived into the sea and disappeared behind the breakers. Finally, like an angel sent from heaven, I caught a glimpse of my daughter's pink rash vest in the distance.

Still not sure how this story would end, I stood helplessly in the surf, crushed by the dreadful realisation that we might lose our beautiful children. The sea was so swift and silent; one minute a sparkling blue playground, the next a grey predator determined to drag its prey beyond reach. A child meant no more to the sea than a shell it licked from the beach.

I did not know how long we waited, perhaps ten minutes, ten achingly long minutes before a lifesaver appeared with our daughter safely on his board and delivered her to the beach. Overwhelmed, I threw my arms around

this stranger who had restored our child to us, sobbing my thanks, grateful beyond words.

Less than an hour after we had arrived, we left the beach, still intact as a family but silent and shocked by the possibility that it could have been otherwise. For days, the harrowing incident left me crying in private for what might have happened.
